- 2. For each question below, write a well-organized paragraph with a thesis, two examples from the text, and a conclusion. Choose one myth per paragraph.
 - a. How do the gods behave towards one another? Choose one myth and give two examples.
 - b. How do the humans behave towards the gods? Choose one myth and give two examples.
 - c. How do the gods behave towards men? Choose one myth and give two examples.
